THE BLACK DRUM SYNOPSIS

SCENE ONE

The Minister, who exerts control, recites "BLACK HEART" depicting a world with no music, no laughter, no love and no freedom.

SCENE TWO

Joan, a performing artist, grieves her dead wife Karen. Her roommates Bree and Oscar, who is also their landlord, stand nearby. Joan speaks to Karen's ghost, about her Butterfly and Bulldog tattoos - beauty and strength. Bree and Oscar squabble and Oscar recites "MONEY". Joan shares that her body is her musical instrument. People don't acknowledge it. She doesn't know how to move on without Karen.

SCENE THREE

Joan is plunged into a sinister world dominated by the minister. She is warned by the decaying tree about the restricting infectious black heart inhabiting this "in-between" world. Squib, the Minister's reluctant lieutenant, appears.

SCENE FOUR

Joan encounters Ava, who dances with the children in this strange world. Joan's tattoos, Bulldog and Butterfly have come to life. Bulldog continues the reprise of "MONEY" while Butterfly is anxious to find Joan. Ava explains that the Minister controls them with dark magic, namely his black drum. Butterfly clarifies that this world is nether reality nor death. Bulldog tells Joan that Karen is dead even in this "in-between" world.

SCENE FIVE

Joan, hiding behind a bush, witnesses the Minister control Karen with his magic and proclaims that no one can escape his world. Joan recovers from what she witnessed, with Ava and Bulldog by her side. Butterfly consoles Joan and recites, "NO COCOON CAN HOLD ME", evoking when she set herself free and emerged as a butterfly

SCENE SIX

Ava explains that they need Joan's music and colour to diminish the black of the drum and free them. Butterfly encourages Joan who then discovers her inner signed music in, "WHAT IS MUSIC". Joan's friends devise a plan to defeat the Minister. Joan will save Karen but cannot stay with her. She will need to let her go. Joan shares her colours with Ava by giving her a yellow pin.

THE BLACK DRUM SYNOPSIS

SCENE SEVEN

Karen asserts that the Minister's vision of no colour, black heart and death is no match to life's greatest force - laughter, tears, compassion and love. Bulldog and Butterfly challenge the Minister. Bulldog recites "BAD DOG, GOOD DOG", contrasting the Minister's evil with his own good inner heart. The Minister subdues and binds them.

SCENE EIGHT

Ava shows the children her yellow pin and tells them that they have a chance to bring colour to the world if they are brave and find their music. Ava bursts out, reciting "VOICE", moving away from shame and fear to a world of love, laughter and dance. To find themselves they must be brave.

SCENE NINE

Squib patrols the drum, reciting "OPPRESSOR'S LAMENT". The oppressive black heart grows and to survive, Squib distributes it. She tells Joan to retreat from the drum. The Minister is challenged without success. He tells Joan to concede to him, as he is a natural part of life. Ava calls out for colour, power and freedom. Butterfly urges Joan to let go of Karen, to find strength in her music and not give up. Joan recites "LOVE IS FREEDOM" with Butterfly and defeats the Minister.

SCENE TEN

Joan collapses after having defeated the Minister. He retreats saying he will get his power back. Karen states she could only come back once and that Joan must take her music to the world. Each finds their own "place". Joan says her farewells. She and Karen, state their love for one another. They all recite "WHAT IS MUSIC" together one last time.

SCENE ELEVEN

In the cemetery, Joan feels Karen's presence. The Minister returns, saying he will always be there to prey on others. He will always be a part of life.

This production is presented with Written and Voice Synopsis and is accessible to non-ASL audiences.

BIOGRAPHIES

CAST



DAWN JANI BIRLEY originally from Saskatchewan, is a versatile actor spanning more than ten years of professional experience in theatre and film. With facial features that can be transformed into many different faces and a strong background in physical theatre, her career takes her all over the world working

with Deaf and hearing actors, directors, and photographers. With a Master of Arts in Physical Theatre with Merit from St. Mary's University, U.K., she is also the Toronto Theatre Critics Award Winner for Best Actress (2017) for her performance of Horatio in *Prince Hamlet* with WhyNot Theatre. Aside from acting, Dawn Jani is often summoned to give workshops/training, motivational speeches and appearances. Her passion is to show that we can work together on the front line in bringing positive change today.



YAN LIU is a Chinese Canadian now residing in Texas. She served as dancer in the China Disabled People's Performing Art Troupe (CDPPAT), Beijing, China from 2003 to 2008. This performance troupe auditioned 40,000 applicants to select 24 dancers to form one international troupe. Yan served as dance

performer, dance mentor, dance instructor and dance captain for the 2008 Beijing Para-lympics Games. She also participated in graceful and colourful dances for audiences of over 80,000 and over a billion television viewers. One of the best performances named *Avalokitesvara Bodbisattva* portrayed important political/performance art figures. Yan

worked for the DEAF CULTURE CENTRE, Canada for two years during which she was solo performer locally, nationally and internationally.



BOB HILTERMANN is from Vancouver, BC, and now residing in California. He was 18 years old when he went to Gallaudet University and learned sign language. It changed his life. Raised in a family of classical musicians, he learned to play drums at age 16. He is well known for his pioneering work in the award-

winning sign language musical theater, Musign and is the drummer for the wildly popular all-deaf rock band, Beethoven's Nightmare performing around the world. As an actor, he has starred in documentary films, TV, soaps, stage productions and feature films. He also produced and starred in the crazy American Sign Language educational series *Shut Up and Sign*, which inspired Bob to pursue filmmaking. Bob is working on his next film, working towards his goal to produce, write and direct a feature film.



DANIEL DURANT was born in Detroit, Michigan, and grew up in Duluth, MN. Daniel performed in Deaf West Theatre productions including lead roles in *Flowers for Algernon* and *Spring Awakening* (Broadway debut as "Moritz"). Joining the Norwegian company Teater Manu, touring for seven months in a

lead role, remains his career highlight. Daniel co-starred as "Matthew" on ABC Family's *Switched at Birth* for several years. He has received numerous awards and recognitions, including the 2016 Theatre Award for Outstanding 2016 Broadway Debut Performance. He co-leads acting workshops for Deaf students, he is an acting teacher/coach for Deaf film camps and does national speaking engagements at colleges and universities. Daniel is passionate about acting, supporting the Deaf community and connecting with new friends globally through his social media ASL videos.



CORINNA DEN DEKKER is a Dutch-Canadian and raised in Southern Ontario. She has been performing since the beginning of high school. In 2014, Corinna's first professional experience in theatre was playing a lead role of *My Name is Dakhel Faraj* with the Kitchener Waterloo Arabic Canadian Theatre. Her credits

include the Theatre Arts program, Fanshawe College's Wendla (*Spring Awakening*), Titania (*A Midsummer Night's Dream*) and Ursula (*Byrthrite*). She is winner of the national Defty Awards of Excellence in the Arts (2014) and known for her sign language broadcast of *Is Somebody Singing* with astronaut Chris Hadfield on the International Space Station. She is a young up and coming Canadian actor having performed in Iceland, Denmark, Norway and Faroes Islands.



AGATA WISNY from Norway, is experienced in the field of theatre and film making production. Since 1999, she has served at Teater Manu in various roles as actor, contributed to film production and video design for theatrical perfor-mances. In Norway, Teater Manu is the only professional theatre featuring sign

language as the stage language. She is currently serving as stage and project manager for *Crying Hands*, which was on tour in New York City, Washington, D.C. and Toronto. Besides being active in the field of theatre, Agata has worked as an Assistant Manager for Clin d'Oeil Festival, since 2005. Clin d'Oeil Festival is the world's largest festival dedicated to theatre film and arts for Deaf audiences hosted in Reims, France biennially. She holds a degree in Visual Effects (VFX) at the Noroff, Norway.



NATASHA C. BACCHUS from Toronto, Ontario is both an award-winning athlete and actor, combining her athleticism with her physicality in theatre. She is recipient of numerous medals in track and field including Gold and Silver from the World Games for the Deaf, Bulgaria (1993) and Gold from Denmark (1997),

Silver from the Pan Am Games for the Deaf, Venezuela (2007) and Master Track Breaking Records in Track & Field (2014-2015). Performance highlights include her debut as Shaw TV Talk Show Host, BC (2014), Verse Festival ASL Storyteller, BC (2014) and ASL Poet, Women of Colour, Sisters in Motion, Quebec (2017/2018). Natasha recently studied at Jane Bryan Films Casting workshop, New York City (2018) and is currently studying documen¬tary filmmaking at Liaison of Independent Filmmakers of Toronto (LIFT) and George Brown College. Natasha was selected winner of Canada Top 100 Black Women to Watch by the Canada International Black Women Event (CIBWE) 2019.

movement and text provide the perfect balance to communicate story.



JEFFREY BAKER - BALLET INSTRUCTOR

Born in Toronto, Ontario, Jeffrey studied at the Martha Graham School of Dance in New York City and with Finis Jhung, David Howard, and American Ballet Theatre among others. He has performed with The Inner Stage, Les

Grands Ballet Canadiens, and The Canadian Opera Company and as a soloist with the Bat Dor Dance Company (European Tour), The Israel Ballet, Capital Ballet (Washington D.C), and the Colorado Ballet. A graduate of the National Ballet Teachers Training Program, he was awarded with Distinction on his Associate I.S.T.D. (Imperial Society of Teachers of Dance), teachers' exam. He taught dance at Mayfield Secondary School (School for the Performing Arts) and created a full-length Nutcracker Suite. DID YOU KNOW

- One in a thousand Canadians uses sign language as a first language.¹ We are your neighbours and colleagues.
- American Sign Language (ASL) is a visual language that uses handshapes, locations, palm orientations and hand movements with facial expressions, body posture, head shift, eye gaze and eye shift. It conveys ideas with its own grammar to express emotions and thoughts. ASL has its own literature and is the foundation of Deaf identity and of shared Deaf culture and heritage.² ASL and langue des signes Québécoise (LSQ) are the primary signed languages in Canada.
- The famous Deaf inventor of the light bulb, phonograph and motion picture camera, Thomas Edison, whose father was Canadian, patented the electric stencil pen (1877) the precursor to tattoo machines still used today.³
- Butterflies are Deaf and some Bulldog breeds are commonly Deaf.
- Deaf View Image Art (De'VIA) is an art genre created by Deaf artists using strong contrasting colours, textures and incorporating Deaf experience and values.
- Who does music belong to? The answer is, it belongs to whatever culture it comes from. Ely Lyonblum, Visual Anthropologist, Ethnomusicologist
- Signed Music is an inter-performance art that develops through shared Deaf community experience. It falls along a continuum but is distinct from, sign language poetry and dance. It may or may not be created with lyrics and it may or may not incorporate cinematography.⁺
- Music is in the rhythm of the heart. . . the rhythm of what surrounds us. We have visual rhythm, we have internal rhythm from within ourselves . . . Ella Mae Lentz, Deaf poet
- Pythagoras, Greek philosopher and mathematician, (571-495 BCE), described music according to the movement of the planets. He called it Musica Mundana . . . Music of the Spheres . . . and stated that our ears are unable to hear it. ⁵
